Najeeb Mahfoudh was born on December 11, 1911. He published 34 novels, over 350 short stories, dozens of movie scripts, and five plays over a 70-year career. Many of his works have been made into Egyptian and foreign films. Mahfoudh was the seventh and the youngest child in a family that had five boys and two girls. After completing his secondary education, Mahfoudh was admitted to King Fouad I University), where he studied philosophy, graduating in 1934. By 1936, he decided to become a professional writer. Mahfoudh then worked as a journalist at Er-Risala, and contributed to El-Hilal and Al-Ahram. Mahfoudh left academy and joined the Egyptian civil service, where he continued to work until 1972. Most of Mahfoudh's early works were set in Cairo. In his works, he described the development of his country in the 20th century. Most of Mahfouz's writings deal mainly with politics. Mahfoudh was awarded the 1988 Nobel Prize in Literature, the only Arab writer to have won the award. Mahfoudh got married when he was 43 years old. In 1954, he married an Egyptian woman, Atiya, with whom he had two daughters, Fatima and Umm Kalthum. He died in Cairo 2006.

Deserts are rich habitats with animals and plants that have adapted to the harsh conditions there. More than one billion people live in desert regions.

Deserts cover more than one fifth of the Earth's land, and they are found on every continent. A place that receives less than (25 centimeters) of rain per year is considered a desert.

deserts as dry and hot, there are cold deserts as well. The largest hot desert in the world, northern Africa's Sahara, reaches temperatures of up to (50 degrees Celsius) during the day. But some deserts are always cold, like the Gobi desert in Asia and the desert on the continent of Antarctica. Others are mountainous. Only about 10 percent of deserts are covered by sand dunes.

Desert animals have adapted ways to help them keep cool and use less water. Camels, for example, can go for days without food and water

Desert plants may have to go without fresh water for years at a time. Some plants have adapted to the dry weather by growing long roots that take water from deep underground. Many desert plants can live to be hundreds of years old.

	WRITING 1 (5 mks)						
5	 Discusses the topic in a lively, interesting way, making effective use of supporting arguments. The points made by the writer are logically organised and very clear. Makes use of a fair range of structures and vocabulary, with a good level of accuracy. 						
4	 Discusses the topic reasonably well, but use of supporting arguments is not fully effective. The points made by the writer are reasonably well organized and mostly clear. Use of grammar and vocabulary is reasonably correct, though rather limited in range. 						
3	 Expresses opinions with some use of supporting arguments, but only in a limited way. The writer makes an attempt to organise his/her points, but this is only partly effective. There is a noticeable lack of accuracy in the use of grammar and vocabulary. 						
2	 Makes an attempt to discuss the topic, but the result is unconvincing and clearly inadequate. Weak organization makes it difficult to follow the points being made by the writer. Grammar and vocabulary contain frequent serious errors.

	WRITING 2 (5 mks)
5	 Tells the story fully and clearly, in a lively, interesting way, providing appropriate details. The text is coherent and easy to read. Not many language errors.
4	 Tells the story clearly enough, but writing lacks interest for the reader. There are several noticeable language errors and the text sometimes lacks coherence.
3	 Manages to convey the main outline of the story, but only in a limited way. Language used is limited in range and/or contains quite frequent errors.
2	 An attempt is made to tell the story, but important points are either missing or unclear. Language used is very limited and/or contains many serious errors.
1	 A <u>very</u> feeble attempt to tell the story. Very little relevant content. Language used is extremely limited and/or seriously distorted.

^{* &}lt;u>NOTE</u>: In WRITING 2, test-writers actually have <u>two</u> different task-options to choose from (*Picture Story* or *Task Instructions*) when preparing the exam-paper. However, as both of these require student to produce a *narrative* text, the same Rating Scale can be used, whichever type of task they use.
