If they do not, they will lose marks. <u>PROCEDURE</u>: Each marker marks the <u>content</u> of the e-mail according to the Rating Scale — then, if either the greeting or the closing are <u>missing</u>, **deductonemark** from the content-score.

Note 2: No marks should be awarded or deducted for the address. Any addresses should be ignored.
